Board Report



The Board is happy to report hiring Ashley Smith for the position of Interim Director of Religious Education until June 30, 2023. Ashley has been a devoted participant of the RE Advisory Committee and programs, including OWL. We're so pleased that she is willing to take on these coordinating and organizing duties this year.

Kim Suske, our dedicated and talented newsletter editor, submitted her resignation effective this summer or as soon as a new editor can take over. Adam Haecker, our administrative assistant, will produce the April newsletter and may be able to add newsletter editor to his administrative duties. The Board wishes to thank Kim for her years of exceptional service. Her work as editor has been crucial for Fellowship communications.

The Board received a complete technology report from Doug Lowthian. Since the beginning of the pandemic, technological services have grown to be an essential part of our Fellowship operations. Here is an abbreviated summary of his report:

"As the Technology Support person for the CUUF, I support many different aspects of our Fellowship's operations. I am always looking for and open to ways to leverage technology in service of the

Fellowship's goals and mission. The biggest part of my job is livestreaming our Sunday services. I approach this with the idea of trying to get the 'Room' into the 'Zoom.' I want those at home to experience what goes on in the space where the service is being held.

This is a list of some of the things I am doing:

- Set up livestream for Zooming services and maintain equipment.
- Monitor and adjust audio and video for Zoom as well as for in-house sound at the Alvord.
- Process a recording of each service.
- Serve as administrator for Google Workspace for drive files, staff and volunteer communications, and documents; MS365; Quickbooks for finances; and Breeze for the Fellowship database. In this role I can create user accounts, provide tech support, change system-wide settings, reset passwords, and troubleshoot access issues.
- Provide occasional training on the use of any of our platforms. I can be available for in-person or online training for groups or individuals as needed."

Ordination Service: An anonymous donor offered to cover the costs, approximately \$1,800, associated with the Ordination Service; this is in addition to the \$300 donated by the Keweenaw UU Fellowship. The Ordination Team is greatly appreciative of their financial support.

The Board is considering in New Business a date for the Annual Meeting in May and to begin a Strategic Planning effort next service year.

2023-2024 Spring Pledge Drive Begins

As you may know, this is the second year that the Chequamegon Unitarian Universalist Fellowship is holding the annual pledge drive in the spring instead of the fall. This alignment with the Fellowship's budget year, which runs from July 1–June 30, gives the CUUF Board advance notice of anticipated income to use while preparing the annual budget in March and presenting it for congregational approval at the annual business meeting in April or May.



Toward that end, we are asking you to make a pledge (not a gift) by April 15, if possible, that will inform our 2023-24 budget planning. Getting pledge intentions in the Spring also provides some peace of mind as we renew employment contracts and other responsibilities on July 1. It is important to

remember that your current pledge for the Fellowship's 2022-23 budget year runs until June 30, 2023 and all contributions received before June 30 will be credited to your pledge for the 2022-23 budget year unless you specify otherwise with your donation.

Radical Doors-Radical Future

Right to Die Information and Discussion

When my mother was diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease in 2002, I became interested in learning about the right-to-die movement. It made sense to me that individuals should have the choice to take control of the time and manner of their death.

I became a member of Final Exit Network (FEN), which I learned about from an ad in UU World. FEN's mission is "To educate qualified individuals in practical, peaceful ways to end their lives, offer a compassionate bedside presence, and defend their right to choose."

Last spring, I trained as a volunteer with FEN's Exit Guide Program. Through the program, volunteers provide information and support to those who are considering ending their lives.

I'll be hosting an informal forum on April 30 at 10 a.m. in the basement of the Washburn Library. I will talk a little about FEN and the Exit Guide Program. Then we'll see what people want to talk about related to the right to die.
